Being a WWII veteran I also look for the listings with our flag shown which denotes fallen comrades. Sometimes there is a claim for being a WWII veteran. Upon checking the date of birth I find that the deceased person was only in their early teens in 1946 when the papers were officially signed, although the war ended in 1945.

Once there was a short story stating that an individual lead a band of soldiers all the way through Germany, and he was only 17. I believe that, at the time he could have driven a school bus safely through Germany because our troops were held up because of an agreement between FDR, Stalin and Churchill.

Another oddity was, our group was sent back to the Munster area to guard POW camps and such. I was selected for guard duty at a German distillery. What a scary duty that was!! It was almost time for the Nazis to give up, and I had a line up of field officers from nearby divisions carrying 5 gallon water cans which they requested filled with the delicious products made in the distillery.

Just then, the attendant came on the intercom to inform us all that we were being delayed. The entire plane let out a collective groan. She resumed speaking to say, "We are holding the aircraft for some very special people who are on their way to the plane and the delay shouldn't be more than 5 minutes." The word came after waiting six times as long as we were promised that "I" was finally going to be on my way home. Why the hoopla over "these" folks? I was expecting some celebrity or sport figure to be the reason for the hold up...Just get their butts in a seat and lets hit the gas I thought.

The attendant came back on the speaker to announce in a loud and excited voice that we were being joined by several U.S. Marines returning home from Iraq!!! Just as they walked on board, the entire plane erupted into applause. The men were a bit taken by surprise by the 340 people cheering for them as they searched for their seats. They were having their hands shook and touched by almost everyone who was within an arm's distance of them as they passed down the aisle. One elderly woman kissed the hand of one of the Marines as he passed by her. The applause, whistles and cheering didn't stop for a long time. When we were finally airborne, "I" was not the only civilian checking his conscience as to the delays in "me" getting home, finding my easy chair, a cold beverage and the remote in my hand. These men had done for all of us and I had been complaining silently about "me" and "my" issues.

I took for granted the everyday freedoms I enjoy and the conveniences of the American way of life. I took for granted others paid the price for my ability to moan and complain about

Memories of the Old Guard

You may call them "The Old Guard" or the "Geezers". Either way they are the members that worked hard for the VFW in the 40's, 50's and 60's when the younger crowd was busy growing up, making money and furthering careers. And there were those whose jobs prevented them from becoming active in the Post. We too, worked to raise families and bring in the bacon, so to speak, but

our hearts were deep in the VFW. Now some are no longer with us and others don't go out to night meetings due to health problems, poor vision, etc. but we are still interested in the welfare of the post.

There was the famous VFW July 4th Festival, second only to V-J Day. It ran 4 to 5 days at the Woodstock City Park. Many of us worked every night operating the various booths and rides until past midnight, then we went to the club and counted money. We all went on to our jobs in the morning, tired but happy.

Loyal workers come to mind: There was Jack Fish who was in charge of the rides; Maynard Wilkerson was in charge of the \$2000 fireworks display. Joe Thiede, Bob and Bud Behler, Art Schuld, Nick Stemper, Dean Mishler, Don Peasley, Roy Stackhouse, Earl Holm, Frank Cacci, Bob Conway, Dwayne Raney, and Irv Burg were some of the loyal workers.

The Mansfield brothers, Harry, Bill and Al, operated the Turtle Game. Arnie Romo and Chester Dietz were in charge of parking and the ladies of the Auxiliary sold tickets for the rides. Each year we gave away a brand new car and Marv Smith, Louie Gerhke and their committee members worked the raffle distributing tickets all over the county. The festival was a great money maker.

In 1959 when I was Senior Vice Commander, I was cochairman of the festival with Arnold Larsen, who was serving as Junior vice. It seems that Woodstock mayor, Ralph Ostrander, was against any drinking in the city park and so the council rejected our request to hold the festival there. Wow, what a blow! We did the next best thing; we rented the McHenry County Fairgrounds and held our festival there. The beer tent was set up just outside of the fairgrounds on a piece of land owned by a member. That was where the beer was sold. The sale of beer was very important as it helped to bring in needed funds.

The festivals were hard work but the same loyal group came forth and we managed to make the yearly event very successful over the years. Also, not known to many, the VFW was in charge of the rides at the McHenry County Fair for many years. And yes, the same loyal bunch took over that task, too!

The World War II National Memorial will be dedicated on Saturday, May 29, 2004. A four day event is planned that will run through the Memorial Day Weekend, May 27 through May 30th.

Construction of this memorial started in September 2001, and is currently on schedule to finish Memorial Day weekend, 2004, and should be open to the public in early April 2004.

So How is Our Website Doing?

Below are some statistics on our web site and some definitions below to help you understand them. Its not the busiest on the web, but it shows that people are visiting.

Unique Visitors:

When tracking the amount of traffic on a Web site, it refers to a person who visits a Web site more than once within a specified period of time. Unique visitors are measured according to their unique IP (Internet Protocol) addresses, which are like online fingerprints, and unique visitors are counted only once no matter how many times they visit the site.

Number of Visits:

A visit is a web user with a unique address entering a website at some page for the first time that day (or for the first time in a lesser time period). The number of visits is roughly equivalent to the number of different people that visit a site.

Pages

A document having a specific URL (Universal Resource Locator) and comprised of a set of associated files. A page may contain text, images, and other online elements. Our web site currently has 16 web pages.

Hit:

When users access a website, their computer sends a request to the site's server to begin downloading a page. Each element of a requested page (including graphics, text, interactive items) is recorded by the site's web server log file as a "hit". This is a poor quide for traffic measurement.

Bandwidth:

The amount of information that can be transmitted over communications lines at one time. Every time someone visits our site, information is transmitted. We have a limit each month on the amount of bandwidth that is used, and then we have to pay a small price for extra bandwidth. Our limit is 2000 MB (mega-bytes) per month. As you can see above, we have not even come close to reaching our limit. A single, 3.5" floppy disk is 1.44 MB in capacity.

Attention All Officers: If you would like a personalized 5040 e-mail address, let me know. With our web site, I can set up to 100 personal email addresses that can forward mail to any address you choose. For example, if someone mails matt.klos@vfw5040.org, that message will be sent automatically to my Yahoo! e-mail account. This is not a 5040 e-mail account where you have to log to get your mail, its just a forwarding service. If you have e-mail, I would at least like all the officers to have a 5040 email address. This way, on the Officers web page listing for the VFW and Ladies Auxiliary, if a visitor wanted to, they could send you an e-mail directly. E-mail me a note with the address you want set up this way and I will make it happen.

go with him at a cost of \$545 per person. This would include bus pick up at Reagan National Airport, hotel lodgings, bus transfer to the various affairs, and reserved seats at the Ceremony. Hello again comrades. I wanted to thank you again for your continued support and contributions to making this news letter possible. I had some interesting letters come my way, some of which made it into this months newsletter. It's always interesting to hear stories of the past, what post members did during the wars they were in

About a month ago, when I was trying to fly home from Baltimore at the end of my work week, weather prevented me from flying out of BWI airport so I had to spend the night at a Holiday Inn. As I had dinner at the bar, I listened to conversation of two men that were obviously in the military. One of them was just getting back from a tour in Iraq, heading home to Washington State.

I started to ask the soldier about his military experience. We shared a common bond in that we were both in Iraq during the Persian Gulf war in 1991. Since then, he mentioned that he had at some point or another been in all the "peace keeping" missions overseas since 1991 and this war with Iraq was his latest.

His meal that he had just finished was the "best tasting steak I had in months." I asked him if this was it, was he headed back home for good? He said, "No, I will spend a week or two back at home and then I head back for another 4 months or so." Back to Iraq? Yes, that was the plan.

We talked some more about what he did during the war, things he had seen, then talked about the Persian Gulf War during 1991. I told him what I had done, what I did after I returned back, assignments, etc. I was just finishing my meal when two more guys came in, both civilians and they got in on our conversation. The two new guys bought him a drink. I listened to the conversation for a little while, then decided it was time to retire back to my room.

As I paid my bill, I went over the soldier and gave him a firm handshake and I said, "Thank you for your hard work and good luck to you. Keep safe." Strange that was for me, being on the other side. He was only 30 and his reason for going back - "I love my country and I love my job." That is our fighting force of today.


