

Auxiliary to Promote Child Safety

It's called a program to "help kids live safely" and the Woodstock VFW Auxiliary is going to do something about it. Nyda Fogarty, Auxiliary president, said the VFW Auxiliary is obtaining the 128-page handbook to provide a copy for each of District 200's 950 fourth and fifth grade students.

Donna Holmes, program coordinator for Gateway Community Safety Net, is contacting area business and professional groups to invite them to participate by underwriting the cost. The book, which costs \$10.50, is called, "Personal Safety for Kids." In introducing the program to parents the publisher explains the book is to teach children that by understanding and observing a collection of safe, simple rules, "young people can stay happy, healthy and safe."

The first 95 pages concentrate on safety information in the following sections: safety at home, school, at play, and away from home. Other safety topics include burns, falls, hitchhiking, awareness of police as friends, suicide and unwelcome touching. The final section is written for parents.

An important aspect of this Safety Net booklet is advice given parents with this explanation: "This book is designed to help your kids live safely without compromising the innocence and wonder of childhood."

Holmes said the book is to be used with the parents and children reading and discussing the book's content together.

The author tells parents, "You may not agree with all ideas but you are encouraged to seek out alternate safety measures you feel are better."

As program coordinator, Holmes reminds potential sponsors as well as parents, "By taking an active role in this project concerning safety education, you are making an investment that will pay dividends for a lifetime." Sponsors will be recognized in the publication.

Ellyn Wreski, District 200 superintendent, examined the book and named Cheryl Metcalf, assistant superintendent of teaching and learning in District 200, to work with the VFW Auxiliary to implement this project.

Commenting on the importance of "personal safety for kids," the World Health Organizations declares, "Almost all accidents are preventable. Education is the most effective way to prevent accidents."

Every day, more than 43,000 North American children are injured seriously enough to require emergency room attention.



Jim Smith, who was an active member of Marine Corps Reserve unit when he was elected VFW Commander in April 2002, is now on active duty in Iraq. Chief Warrant Officer Smith is serving with A company Marine Wing Communications Squadron-48, Marine Wing Communications Squadron-38 (Reinforced), Third Marine Air Wing in Iraq. He served as VFW Post 5040 Commander June 2002 to June 2003.

Jim's wife Tamara and their children, Caitlin, 12; Jimmy, 10; Rebecca, 9; and David, 8, live in Wonder Lake. Tamara, who has a bachelor's degree from Southern Illinois University, is a stay-athome mom, and is active with both Cub Scout and Girl Scout programs.

Before being called to active duty, Jim was committee chairman for Cub Scout Pack 776 which is sponsored by St. Mary's Church. Tamara says one challenge this summer has been her effort to develop a lawn at their new house in Wonder Lake.

"My goal is to have it 'really nice' for him when he returns home in spring of 2005. With email we are able to hear from him frequently," said Tamara.

Fun at John Hanson's Picnic By Matt Klos







"I was responsible to the company commander located in Wichita, Kansas and to the battalion commander located in Charlotte North Carolina with the complete operation of the detachment. I had to keep in constant contact with the Marines of my unit and with the Indianapolis' site'sactive duty staff to make sure we were ready for potential mobilization," said Smith.

When not at drill or active duty, Smith is employed with Chicago Communication Service, Elmhurst as a field telecommunications technician. That company is the local Motorola field service provider.

"I repair E911 phone systems, radio dispatch consoles, radio infrastructure and other communication devices," he said. "I am on a military leave of absence. In January 2004 I accepted orders for a six-month term of active duty to assist Marine Forces Reserve in transition to the new Navy-Marine Corps Intranet.

"I was released from those orders on May 31. I was

mobilized on June 1 with Marine Wing Communication Squadron 48 (part of the Fourth Marine Air Wing)."

Jim and Tamara met when each was on active duty in the Marine Corps stationed at Camp Lejeune, North Carolina. They have been together for almost 11 years. Tamara was on active duty for four years and been in the Reserves for four years.

As a former Marine she appreciates the demands made on her husband and provides strong support for his military endeavors.

Observed Tamara, "Jim feels it is his duty to protect and serve this country of ours. We are extremely proud of him and his service. He is willing to make a difference in the world when so many people aren't willing to try to make a difference."

Caitlyn is a seventh grader at St. Mary's in Woodstock. The younger three children attend Greenwood Elementary School.

Notice on Death of William Cooney

William Cooney, 77, has died following an outstanding career as a reporter for the San Francisco Chronicle. Nyda Fogarty, 1945 Woodstock High School graduate, has provided us with the news of Cooney's death in February.

Cooney, a 1945 St. Mary's High School graduate, was an outstanding football and basketball player under Coach Mel Stuessy. He served in the United States Navy after World War II, then obtained a degree in journalism from Marquette University in 1953.

He worked at a newspapers in San Carmel and San Jose before joining the Chronicle in 1965. His work drew praise from Chronicle colleagues at the time of his death. Chronicle editorial staff members praised his work covering federal court cases, saying he used his charm and shoe leather to develop an army of sources among judges, prosecutors and defense attorneys at San Francisco's huge federal building.

Michael Taylor, a longtime reporter at the Chronicle where Cooney worked until his retirement in 1989, said, "Bill was a thorough reporter and was highly respected by his peers in the federal pressroom."

U.S. District Judge Samuel Conti observed, "He knew who

the court reporters were. He knew who the law clerks were. Everyone in the court liked him, and therefore he was able to get news items that other reporters did not obtain."

Joseph Russoniello, who was U.S. attorney in San Francisco when Cooney covered federal court, recalled, "What you saw was what you got with him. He was a straightshooter, fun to be around, knew his business and had a great nose for news."

Assistant U.S. Attorney Dennis Nerney said, "Bill was a no-nonsense reporter who didn't sit around and wait for a press release. He had a wry sense of humor. He knew what the rules were and he asked you the questions anyway, and there was never any hard feelings."

Cooney is survived by four children: Cathryn Ringwald, Patrick Cooney, Michaela Lindsey and Brigid Standfield. His wife Dorothea died in 1984.

William Cooney's father, John, was a second cousin to Herbert Cooney, well-known Woodstock banker. His older brother, Neil Cooney, was Post 5040's first Commander, serving in that capacity in 1945 and until the election of April of 1946.

William, Neil, Harold and Helen Cooney Dreyer were the children of John and Catherine Cooney.

Parking Lot Work at VFW

The next VFW 5th District Meeting will take place at the Woodstock VFW on November 7th. Lunch will be served at 12:00 pm, with the meeting following.


If you have not attended a 5th District Meeting before, try to attend this one. It's close to home and early in the new VFW year. Come out and let your District representatives know what's on your mind.
