

World War II Memorial Dedicated

World War II veterans from Illinois will be special guests at the dedication of a World War II Illinois veterans memorial conducted December 4 at Oakridge Cemetery in Springfield.

The memorial, which is dedicated to the 987,000 Illinois men and women who served in World War II, cost between \$1.3 million and \$1.5 million, according to George Cordier, a director of the Memorial Association.

Of that, \$150,000 came from the federal government and \$1.3 million from the state. The Memorial Association received another \$60,000 as a result of a check-off box on state income tax forms last year.

Also, commemorative granite bricks placed in the central plaza are being sold starting at \$300 each. As of November 22, 1,195 commemorative bricks have been sold; there is room for 3,700 altogether.

People who purchase a brick may have it engraved with the name of a loved who served in World War II. For information call the toll-free number. (866) 992-4145.

The Memorial Association also is selling sponsor bricks; so far about 100 have been sold.

The Urbana firm of Isaksen Glerum & Associates is the architect of record for the new memorial.

Dr. Neuchiller Dies at Age 91

Dr. Bernard B. Neuchiller, one of 224 charter members of Woodstock VFW Post 5040, became involved in military service as a member of the Army Reserve. By March 1940 he had established his medical practice in Woodstock after joining Dr. Thomas Brand. He was called by the Army Reserve in March 1940 to serve a year of duty and given a month to close his office.

Dr. Neuchiller died November 13 following an illness that slowed him down the past year. He would have been 92 this December 13.

After war was declared in December 1941, he served on active duty from 1941 to 1946. He was stationed at three sites in the United States. During the war he was stationed in Brisbane, Australia. The Australian government had taken Chinese people off the seas and put them in internment camps. The U.S. government took over, built a camp for the Chinese and taught them to build barges for the military. Dr. Neuchiller had his dispensary in the camp, treating the few U.S. soldiers living there and the 1,000 Chinese workers for 23 months.

He re-established his medical practice first in a vacant apartment at Calhoun and Dean streets and then in 1951 built an office at 454 West Jackson Street. He especially recalled the patient-doctor relationship.

"I was involved in the private lives of my patients. They came to me for personal advice, and we had a good rapport. Their problems were my problems," he remembered.

The accepted fee for an office call was \$1.25 in his earlier medical practice year. Obstetrical care cost \$50. Included was all pre-natal care, delivery, a 10-day hospital stay, care of the baby and a six-week checkup!

"Our standard speech to the patient was, 'You pay as you go along,' but it never worked," he smiled.

Many patients had little money after the war. He continued. "We would go along for weeks without pay. We got by on the money my wife saved while I was in the service."

One giant breakthrough in medicine was penicillin, an antibiotic. It was available after the war in 1946. Previous to penicillin a sulfa drug was used. He described the new discovery as a wonder drug. "It eliminated infections without having to resort to certain types of surgery. It had to be injected every four hours but it was improved and became longer-acting," he recalled.

I will remember Dr. Neuchiller as a gentle person, kind, thorough, unhurried and deeply involved in his community. He established an attendance record as a Kiwanis member. He served as an active member of the medical staffs at Memorial Hospital and Harvard Hospital.

He was a co-founder of the Adult and Child Rehab Center. He received great satisfaction in the success of the therapy center which has grown to become an outstanding McHenry County patient-caring facility. He maintained his association throughout the organization's 55 years as its medical adviser.

He served on the board most of those years, often-times as president or vice president of the board of directors.

Dr. Neuchiller came to Woodstock in 1939 in answer to an advertisement by Dr. Thomas Brand, a wellestablished Woodstock physician who was also the county home physician. Dr. Neuchiller's immediate job was to post quarantine signs throughout the county.



Old-timers will remember his first office after the war was in a building on the Square owned by Charlie Hayes, and Todd Nolan. A year later he relocated in a vacant first floor apartment at Calhoun and Dean streets owned by Mr. Burton. In 1951 he built an office on West Jackson Street. He speaks with pride of those years which saw him experience the introduction of penicillin in his earlier practice days and the tremendous technological advances.

Though he retired in 1993, he continued to attend medical seminars to keep abreast of medical advances. Advancements in the use of antibiotics and more sophisticated advances in surgical techniques were among interests he followed with his innate curiosity and professional interest.

The Therapy Center honored him with its distinguished award in 1993. The Woodstock Chamber of Commerce and Industry chose Dr. Neuchiller recipient of its prestigious Harold Buschkopf Award in 1996. This award reflects community involvement and leadership—a person who has made a difference "and made the community a better place, to live, work and play."

Ralph Ritter Resigns from Board By Matt Klos

On October 16, Ralph Ritter turned in his resignation from the VFW 5040 Board. Ralph was also the canteen manager. We are sorry to see Ralph leave, but for the past several years he has "dedicated his life" to see that the post get to where it is today. In the past several years, when the post was on the verge of closing, Ralph played a major role in getting it back on its feet. From maintenance to payroll, security features to post improvements, electrical work to heating work, Ralph has done it all.

"I've had enough," said Ralph. "The work I was doing, along with the help of others, required so much of my time. I have fond memories of many people I worked with at the post, but I feel that it is time to move on."

One project that will have to be taken over is the Vietnam Wall scheduled to come to Woodstock in 2005. To date, none of the other Veterans organizations Ralph has contacted has offered to help out with this. If this is something that any one might be willing to chair, please contact the post. Ralph, thank you so much for your time and dedication. Good luck to you!:-)


