

Veterans day 2005 By Don Peasley VFW News Editor 1955-2002

A large turnout crowded around program participants as Woodstock honored veterans of all wars with its annual Veterans Day tribute Friday, November 11. That date - November 11 in 1918 - marked the end of World War I. Armistice Day was observed for years, always on that date marking the end of World War I, "the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month."

President Dwight Eisenhower changed the name to Veterans Day in 1954 to recognize men and women who served in the Korean War.

The tradition of honoring all veterans continues. VFW Chaplain Howard Engstrom included those who have served and are serving in Afghanistan and Iraq in his prayers to Almighty God. Engstrom, World War II veteran, expressed thankfulness that we live in a country where citizens are willing to "pay the ultimate sacrifice to grant us freedom, prosperity and blessing."

He expressed thanks to our Heavenly Father for veterans' willingness to preserve the United States as a peaceful nation. Added Engstrom, "We pray that you will keep the United States a shrine of peace and democracy. May we all cultivate a spirit of peace and unity. May we perpetuate this day to honor our veterans

in this community and to honor our veterans around the world who today are making the supreme sacrifice."

Mayor Brian Sager joined in the ceremony conducted by Thom Gillespie, Post 5040 Commander. Sager expressed thanks to veterans for serving this nation and recalled that men and women have given and continue to give their time and life in a sacrifice to support the United States.

"They are in the hearts of all of us. They realize that rights and freedom do not come without sacrifice. We remember with pride and gratitude those in the Armed Forces today," concluded Sager.

Congresswoman Melissa Bean sent her Veterans Day tribute through her District director, Gideon Blustein. Reading her message, Bean said, "As a daughter of a former Marine, I have a special appreciation for our veterans and their contributions to our great nation.

"Freedoms and prosperity we enjoy today are due in large part to the millions who have served or are currently serving in our Armed Forces."

Bean said veterans have expressed concern to her about a breakdown in the quality and efficiency of medical care. She said the Department of Veterans Affairs has taken new, innovative steps to improve the quality of services provided veterans and has worked to increase efficiency.

Bean expressed this personal concern: "The duration of processing disability claims, coverage of services and improved accessibility to the VA continue to be issues of importance."

Bean said she has signed on to support three pieces of legislation that take steps to address those issues and to treat current veterans and veterans returning from Iraq "with the respect they deserve."

"Adopting those three measures will bring a level of equity to veterans' benefits that is lacking now."

Bean told the audience, which included a large number of veterans, that she will work hard to see that Congress makes it a priority to improve veterans' services.

The three legislations Bean refers to are (1) H.R. 303 Retired Pay Restoration Act; (2) H.R. 968 updating the Survivor Benefit Plan; and (3) H.R. 4025 The Disabled Veterans Fairness Act.

Nyda Fogarty, president of the Woodstock VFW Auxiliary offered a tribute to veterans followed by Dwayne Raney, American Legion chaplain, giving the closing prayer.

During the program three Northwood students read winning essays on the theme, "Honor Through Service." Those students were Kelly Goerlitz, 6th grade, Lark Meiners, 7th grade, and Lauraleigh Heffner, 8th grade. Heffner also led the audience in singing the National Anthem and God Bless America.

A ham dinner was served to program participants and the public, prepared by VFW staff members and served by both Auxiliary and VFW members.

- Auxiliary and VFW members wrap 400+ Christmas gifts for children of VFW members.
- VFW bowling makes the newsletter. The post sponsors a full league of 10 teams at Edgetown Lanes and a team at Sherburne Lanes.
- 522 guests attended the Annual Christmas party!
- Roger Schultz is the winner in a Pheasant Contest. His entry was 25 %-inch (tail feather that long).
- VFW receive national attention for \$1,500 pledge to the Memorial Hospital for McHenry County fund drive.
- Commander Earl Holm presents the post's annual award for Most Valuable player to Terry Britz, St. Mary's quarterback who piloted the team to the conference co-championship.

St. Mary's School students, faculty and parents participated in an assembly in the gymnasium to honor veterans with a program during the week the nation honors all veterans on a day devoted to the memory and recognition to those who have served (or are serving) in the military forces of this country. Students were encouraged to invite a family member or friend who had served in the armed forces of the United States.

Ed O'Brien, superintendent, reviewed the history of Veterans Day and said, "After many years of fighting, World War I ended with an armistice. Fighting on the western front in Europe ended on November 11, 1918, and until 1954 that date was honored as Armistice Day.

"President Dwight Eisenhower in 1954 designated November 11 as Veterans Day to honor all those who had served in the military service which by that time included men and women involved in the Korean War."

O'Brien said, "Since that time veterans have served in Vietnam, Desert Storm war and in Iraq and Afghanistan."

Recognizing veterans in the audience, O'Brien added, "Some of those with us today were directly involved in these military campaigns.

"We honor them and all who served our country to defend our safety, personal liberties and freedom. Always remember that those who wear our nation's uniforms serve with pride.

"Today we say 'Thank You' to veterans and tell all veterans we are proud to be Americans."

upper level and the turkey raffle held on the lower level. The bar was packed and kept the three to four bartenders constantly moving throughout the night.

Approximately 300 dinners were served this night. Dinner for the night was, of course, turkey. A lot of it at that. Prepared were six 25 lb. turkeys, three 12 lb. turkeys, one 18 lb. turkey, and 30 lbs. of turkey breast.

As dinner was served to patrons throughout the night by the volunteer help of the 18 Woodstock Little League members, the traditional paddle wheel was spun. Bob Gaylord announced the winning numbers of the prizes for each paddle wheel series which consisted of two turkeys and a meat package. A total of 15 series were run, each with 90 tickets at \$1.00 per ticket. This brought in \$1,350.00

Towards the end of the night, the grand prizes were awarded. Ray Benoy, VFW member and owner of Benoy Motors in Woodstock, drew out the \$150.00 grand prize. A big thank you goes out to Ray who sold approximately 7,200 tickets for this raffle. Ray has continuously helped the post each year by selling a large number of tickets.

Now for the breakdown in numbers. A total of 16,000 tickets were ordered this year. Sent out to each member on the mailing list as well as businesses were 625 books of 10 tickets each. Interestingly, only about 44% of the tickets sent out were returned with filled out stubs and money to go with them.

Only 49 dinners were sold the actual night of the raffle. The rest were free dinners for each book ten tickets sold. If you sold a book of ten, a free dinner ticket was given to the seller. Ticket sales amounted to \$12,500. We actually ran out of turkey raffle tickets the night of the raffle.

Taking out the expense of the 74 turkeys, 12 meat packages, kitchen (cook) help, the net profit for the night was \$11,376.00. This was a very successful night for the post.

This raffle wouldn't have been possible if it weren't for the many helping hands that donated the time to make this a success. Thank you to the many people that helped in the kitchen, many of them donating their time for free, the Woodstock Little League that bussed tables, served food and soft drinks (the Kunzie, Stroh, and Barger family and friends), the people that set up the tables and chairs, and especially the patrons who bought raffle and paddle wheel tickets, the post thanks you all. There are a lot of people (VFW members, bar staff, kitchen staff, family and friends of members of the VFW) whom I didn't mention, but you know who you are. Thank you so much for your time and effort. We couldn't have done without you. You helped to make this a very successful Turkey Raffle 2005!




