

### Stand Down event planned

CRYSTAL LAKE, IL – A Stand Down for homeless veterans will take place on October 2 and 3, 2006, at YMCA Camp Algonquin, which is located at 1889 Cary Road, Algonquin. The sponsoring organization is the National Association of System Administrators Education Corporation (NASA Education), a Crystal Lake-based 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization that provides vocational training for displaced, disabled and other U.S. veterans in transition.

"This is an opportunity for all of us to come through for those of our nation's heroes who need our help," said John Blanchard, executive director of NASA Education. "We have been gratified by the number of individuals, agencies, professionals, community groups and businesses that are coming together to show their appreciation and support for the sacrifices these homeless veterans made for all of us."

Hours for the Stand Down will be 8:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. on Monday, October 2, and 8:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. on Tuesday, October 3. Homeless veterans who are registered may spend the night on Monday, October 2.

The Stand Down comes from a venerable military tradition. In times of war, exhausted combat units requiring time to rest and recover were removed from the battlefields to a place of relative security and safety. Troops were able to take showers, get clean uniforms, enjoy warm meals, receive medical and dental care, mail and receive letters, and enjoy the camaraderie of friends in a safe environment.

Today, Stand Down refers to a grass-roots, community-based intervention program designed to help the nation's estimated 200,000 homeless veterans "combat" life on the streets. Homeless veterans are brought together in a single location and are provided access to the community resources needed to begin addressing their individual problems and rebuilding their lives. In the military tradition, Stand Down afforded battle-weary soldiers the opportunity to renew their spirit, health and overall sense of well-being. Today's Stand Down affords the same opportunity to homeless veterans.

From 100 to 150 homeless veterans are expected to attend the two-day event in McHenry County and receive services, which will include free haircuts on Tuesday provided by volunteer stylists from Sport Clips Haircuts located in McHenry, health care screenings on Monday by the

North Chicago VA Medical Center, job counseling, referrals for legal aid, food stamps, housing assistance, toiletry kits, showers, and meals. The Stand Down will be partially funded through a U.S. Department of Labor (DOL) and Veterans Employment and Training Services (VETS) grant.

The homeless veterans' active duty periods will be verified on-site by the VA to confirm eligibility for services.

The Sesquicentennial celebration extended over the weekend of August 25-27, and among many attractions was a Russian made T-34 tank, used by the German during World War II.

2006-2007 Theme "Freedom's Challenge" Entry Deadline November 1, 2006

The Voice of Democracy, endorsed by the National Association of Secondary School Principals' contest criteria, is an audio essay contest for high school students in grades 9-12. The annual contest, which is designed to foster patriotism, allows students the opportunity to voice their opinion in a three to five minute essay based on an annual theme.

Created in 1947, the scholarship program annually provides more than \$3 million in scholarships. Each Department's first-place winner receives an all-expense-paid trip to Washington, D.C., plus the opportunity to compete for national scholarships. The first-place national winner receives a \$30,000 scholarship.

between men dressed as German occupiers of France and American infantrymen helping defeat the Nazis. The reenactment battles took place on a hillside with woods and ravine in Harvard's Lions Park.

Howard Engstrom, VFW Post 5040 chaplain, was among the dignitaries on the reviewing stand for one of the three battles staged by the two infantry groups. He was accompanied by Aaron Somerville, his 16-year-old grandson.

The reenactment included impressive military equipment from the past, including a World War II jeep, ambulance, Dodge weapons carrier, 30-caliber machine guns, and troops with Springfield and M-1 rifles (all firing blanks).

O'Brien described the situation as the battle proceeded up the hill and encountered a German patrol with the World War II tank. O'Brien said the tank was made by the Russians with armor attached to make it look like the U.S. Tiger tank. An Indiana museum owns the tank and Mike Dragisich transported it on a flatbed truck to Harvard's Sesquicentennial attraction.

Visitors to the Sesquicentennial were able to visit the campsite and see a display of weapons.

had more food leaving through the kitchen

Commander Lyford's letter in last months *VFW News* stated that the bar is losing money. Since he is the one counting the money and making the deposits, I think he would be the one to know how the bar business is doing. Apparently he doesn't because the bar and the kitchen are both doing OK.

I think what Bill meant so say was that the income from those two areas is insufficient to maintain the entire building. To say that the bar or the kitchen is losing money is not correct. The building maintenance is higher than our income because the area upstairs does not support itself.
