The Woodstock Little League is preparing for its 53rd season and the VFW has been an active participant in the program throughout these decades of baseball! VFW is sponsoring a youth baseball again this year.

Long-time members will remember the VFW was an active participant in organizing the Little League in 1954. The VFW, American Legion, Elks Lodge, Knights of Columbus and Moose Lodge were founding Woodstock organizations providing both financial help and manpower to launch this youth program for boys age 8 to 12 years of age.

At that time the National VFW conducted a Teen-er League for boys 13-15years-of-age so Woodstock had its own Teen-er League team. In fact, that program continued through 1970.

The Woodstock Teen-er League team

managed by Jim Smith won the state title in a play-off against West Allis, Wisconsin, defending national champion. Woodstock won the first game, lost the second game and lost the final game in a doubleheader in July of that year. West Allis then repeated as national champions.

This year, Little League concentrates on boys and girls ages 7 to 12. The Little League took over the 13-16 age group with the demise of the Teen-er League. For the second year the Greater Woodstock Baseball Association is in charge of the older age group.

Bob Stroh, Little League president, says Little League will have 350 players on 34 teams and Opening Day will be Saturday, April 28 at Bates Park

The VFW continues to provide accommodations for the Little League to conduct its annual player registration and provides facilities for the board to meet monthly in our building. The player draft will be conducted at the VFW in mid-March.

The Little League adults and players reciprocate, assisting at VFW special event dinners.



VFW Post 5040 member Don Peasley honored with award

Don Peasley's involvement with the Woodstock VFW as founder and editor of the Woodstock *VFW News* to report activities related to veterans was a factor in his being chosen for a significant honor.

Bill Lyford, WS VFW Commander, and his wife Eileen, were among those invited to a ceremony when Mayor Brian Sager presented Don with the Illinois Humanities Council Studs Terkel Award on February 25.

"Don's work in photographing and reporting events in McHenry County for almost 60 years was valuable in preserving historical aspects of McHenry County's activities and changes," said Mayor Sager in discussing the city council's nomination of Don for the award.

The award is named after Studs Terkel, Pulitzer Prize winning author and Chicago radio-television commentator.

In the formal nomination Mayor Sager said, "Don Peasley has chronicled thousands of significant history and cultural events in McHenry County. His literally tens of thousands of photographs and seemingly almost as many newspaper stories on the events, times and people of Woodstock and McHenry County are testaments to the dynamic character of our

community, as well as his own commitment to historic documentation.

"Among the many significant events he has covered have been the birth and growth of the Woodstock Little League, Woodstock VFW, Memorial Medical Center, Farm Bureau, and the McHenry County Fair.

Today these organizations are institutional and woven into the mainstream fabric that defines Woodstock and reflects the changes in the agricultural face and the people who have been the backbone of McHenry County over the past 60 years.

"In 1955, Mr. Peasley founded the *VFW News* chronicling the history and events of Woodstock Post 5040. He served as editor of that publication until 2002, creating a special issue in 1996 commemorating the 50th anniversary of the Post.

"Don Peasley generously donated his treasured collection of historical photographs and negatives to the McHenry County Historical Society. The Society will computerize and preserve the collection in archival quality folders and containers for the enjoyment and education of Woodstock and McHenry County residents for generations to come."

1972 Auxiliary Teacher of the Year celebrates 90th birthday

The Woodstock community turned out in large numbers in late February to honor one of the community's most popular and prominent people. The celebration was to help Verda Dierzen observe her 90th birthday at an open house Saturday, February 24.

Verda, who grew up on a farm near Greenwood began her teaching career at Greenwood School in 1936. She complemented her teaching career as administrator in District 10 and District 200 before retiring in 1972.

It's noteworthy to point out that Verda was honored as Teacher of the Year at the Woodstock VFW Auxiliary's annual salute to all teachers in 1972. The Anderson family grew up at a farm near the intersection of Route 120 and Charles Road. Verda attended the one room school named Charles School. (Her older brother Clayton Anderson still lives on that family farm!)

After becoming Greenwood principal, she worked as assistant county superintendent of schools from 1945 to 1950. She returned to the classroom in 1950, initiating kindergarten at Greenwood and Westwood schools in the newly-organized District 10 school district (comprised of 26 rural schools surrounding Woodstock).

Dierzen added other subjects to her work load while becoming principal at Westwood in 1956. She was instrumental with Mary Endres in developing an innovative, personalized teaching philosophy. When Districts 10, 72 and 152 were com-

bined into District 200 in 1969, Verda became assistant superintendent, in charge of instruction and school bus transportation.

After the formation of D200, Verda Dierzen and Mary Endres were instrumental in developing the District 200 curriculum to such a high level of accomplishment that it earned national attention.

Her service continues after retirement. For example, she worked part-time at SE-DOM as an instructor consultant for nine years after retirement, became active in the Retired Teachers Association which still occupies some of her time. She schedules a meeting with students at the school that has her name.

Dierzen keeps up on current activities with participation in Retired Teachers programs and attending timely activities. She made a point to hear Orion Samuelson's Jan. 28 discussion on preserving farmland and protecting sources of water in McHenry County.

Philosophically, she declares, "Schools and classrooms should be as attractive as possible. Children should be involved in making them that way.

"I believe school life is not preparation for life but is life itself and should be in keeping with that philosophy. Home and school should be a true partnership with parents involved in school planning and their child's education at the school."

She urges teachers to know each of their children "very well" and points out each child is different and adds, "The teacher needs to know the strengths and weaknesses and interests of each of her children."

Continues Dierzen, "The teacher needs to guide them in their total growth and development toward their potential." Both Dierzen and Endres believed meaningful work relating to various curriculum areas develops life experiences, citing for example, "We had school stores that involved mathematics and we had citizenship clubs that brought courtesy into contact with others. We included real life experiences at our school environment."

One of her satisfactions as an educator was to get parents involved in the ongoing education at the school. This was especially true at District 10 where parent involvement related to all subject areas. Talking about accomplishments at District 10, she said simply, "District 10 was well ahead of its time with things we were doing."

While leading District 10, both Dierzen and Endres were involved in courses at the University of Chicago, and this included taking classes with Ethel Kawin, children psychologist at the University of Chicago.

Furnace installation in 2006 sees payoff



Postage rates go up, effective May 14

What does the Postage rate increase have to do with our Post you ask? You hold the answer in your hand - this newsletter! Yes, the rate increase will affect our mailing of the newsletter each month beginning in June and any other mass mailing the Post does.

When looking into what the increase meant for our Post, it was good news and bad news. I didn't think anything of it until I remembered that our newsletter has a permit imprint. Because our postal system has become so automated by mechanical handling of mail, the

rate increase actually has some benefits for us.

The way our mail is handled now is that we are charged a non-machinable rate. For last months issue, it was \$110.78. Under the new rates that go into effect, non-machinable pieces have increased significantly. The new rate would add \$59.80 each month or \$717.54 a year.

The good news is that with a little extra time prepping the mail, the newsletter can qualify as machinable by adding two mail tabs to seal the newsletter. By doing so, our mail costs will actually *decrease* by \$15.47 a month, saving \$185.69 a year.

The other cost that increases is the permit, which goes up by \$15.00 per year.

So, with the increase in rates it actually works out better for the Post. For my wife and I prepping the mail, we have to handle each newsletter a little more to put on the mail tabs and the address labels.

We have this month and next month at the old rates, then with the June newsletter you should be seeing tabs on the newsletter. Any problems, let me know.


