## VFW Post 5040 Officers elected for 2009-2010 By Don Peasley

Two Vietnam Army veterans and a 1986 West Point graduate have been elected to lead the Woodstock VFW for 2009-2010. Officers for the new year were chosen at the VFW's April 20 meeting.

Mike Lackey, 60, Vietnam War veteran, was elected Post Commander to succeed Fred Noble, who was elected Quartermaster. Lackey served in the Army from 1968 to 1971 with the 44th Medical Division of the 43rd Medical Brigade. He was stationed at Fort Bragg, North Carolina in 1970-71 working in a surgical hospital. He was born in Chicago and graduated from the University of Wisconsin at Oshkosh. He returned to college in 1971 and graduated in the paramedic class in 1972. He received his master's degree from Northern Illinois University in 1975.

He started working at Harper College in 1974. He was an English professor at Harper College for 32 years, retiring in

His wife Susan's career includes work as assistant administrator in District 47. The Lackeys have five children: Eric, Elkhorn, Wisc.; Craig, Hanover Park; Colin, Woodstock; Colleen, Malmo, Sweden; and Stephen, Johnsburg.

Mike held offices as Junior and Senior Vice Commander and has been a participant in such Post 5040 activities as the annual Soup to Nuts, Poppy Day, Patriot Pen program and Voice of Democracy. His community service activity included participant as a Boy Scout leaders for seven years.

Ed Lumpp, elected Senior Vice Commander, is a 68-year-old Army veteran who served in 1968 and 1969 in Vietnam with the 11th Armored Cavalry. He was discharged in July 1970 with the rank of Specialist Fourth Class. Lumpp has two children, Gary and Kerry. Ed works in bonded warehousing as a housing specialist.

# The meaning of Memorial Day

Has this special day of remembrance been lost on the American people?

It's a sacred day to all war veterans: None need to be reminded of the reason that Memorial Day must be commemorated. But what about the general public, and more important, future generations? Do most non-veterans really recognize the importance of the day honoring their fellow Americans killed in war?

Judging from what Memorial Day has become—simply another day off from work—the answer is a resounding no. Perhaps a reminder is due then. And it is the duty of each and every veteran to relay the message.

Sacrifice is meaningless without remembrance. America's collective consciousness demands that all citizens recall and be aware of the deaths of their fellow countrymen during wartime.

Far too often, the nation as a whole

takes for granted the freedoms all Americans enjoy. Those freedoms were paid for with the lives of others few of us actually knew. That's why they are all collectively remembered on one special day.

This should be regarded as a civic obligation. For this is a national debt that can only be truly repaid by individual Americans. By honoring the nation's war dead, we preserve their memory and thus their service and sacrifice in the memories of future generations.

They came from all walks of life and regions of the country. But they all had one thing in common—love of and loyalty to country. This bond cemented ties between them in times of trials, allowing a diverse lot of Americans to achieve monumental ends.

We remember the loss of loved ones, a sense of loss that takes group form. In essence, America is commemorating those who made the greatest sacrifice possible giving one's own life on behalf of others.

Means of paying tribute vary. Pausing for a few moments of personal silence is available to everyone. Attending commemorative ceremonies is the most visible way of demonstrating remembrance: Placing flags at gravesites, marching in parades, sponsoring patriotic programs, dedicating memorials and wearing Buddy Poppies are examples.

Whether done individually or collectively, it is the thought that counts. Personal as well as public acts of remembering are the ideal. Public displays of patriotism are essential if the notion of remembering war dead is to be instilled in youth.

As America's older war veterans fast disappear from society's landscape, there are fewer and fewer standard-bearers left to carry the torch of remembrance. Such traditions will live on only if there is a vibrant movement to which that torch can be passed.

Now, more than in recent years, the enduring relevance of Memorial Day should be clearly evident. With two wars under way, the public has no excuse not to remember.

This much is owed to the more than 3,600 Americans who have died thus far in Afghanistan and Iraq.
