Past Post Commander Stemper dies By Don Peasley

Nicholas Stemper, 90, who served in the Army during World War II as a rifleman in all phases of Infantry weapons and tactics, died May 2 at his home. During active duty he served as a Squad Leader in the South Pacific for 24 months and earned the rank of Staff Sergeant.

Nick, who was born in Romania in October 1919, came to the United States when he was 11. He grew up in Chicago and married Loretta Pankratz November 16, 1946. Loretta died in December 2009. After military service he began a 40-year career at Union Special in Huntley.

Stemper became active in the Woodstock VFW in the 1950s and was a Life Member. He served as Senior Vice Commander for a year before his election as Post Commander in 1959. He was quite active the Fourth of July Festival in the early 1950s and headed the membership committee before being elected an officer. He was manager and coach in the Woodstock Little League when his son Patrick played with three Little League teams. The father-son relationship continued in the Teen-er League when Patrick advanced to the 15-16-year-old League

Patrick remembers his father's involvement in the VFW. He recalls most of all the family going to the VFW for Friday night fish fries. Asked how he will remember his father, he said, "I'll remember him as an outstanding rock." It is a good description because it fits his nickname 'Rocky.'

Survivors include his son Patrick; two daughters Lizbeth (Dr. Kenneth) Albrecht, and Linda (Donald) Fruland; and eight grandchildren.

Memorial Day 2010 By Don Peasley VFW News Editor 1955-2002

Three World War II veterans - longtime members of the Woodstock VFW Post 5040 - were honored as parade marshals on Memorial Day as the Woodstock community remembered those men and women who have served in the nation's armed forces.

The occasion was May 31, a morning thunderstorm did not lessen the solemnity of this annual observance.

Commenting on the selection of this year's parade marshals, Alan Belcher, master of ceremony and a Vietnam War veteran said, "We would like to pay a special thanks to those who fought in World War II. Our servicemen and women fought and died to preserve our freedom and help save the world from tyranny. A grateful nation honors and salutes you who have served."

Belcher asserted the three men recognized have honored their fallen comrades by serving their country and communities through the lives.

The three: Harold Irwin enlisted in the Army in December 1939. He served in the crew that kept the B-26 and B-27's fighting the Japanese. He was discharged in late 1945.

Robert Gibson enlisted in the U.S. Navy in May 1942 and after training was sent to patrol the Aleutian Islands. He was discharged in 1945. Gibson was recalled to active duty in 1951 and served aboard a destroyer during the Korean War.

Jim Hodges entered the service in September 1943. He was trained as a medical technician and served in Belgium until he was wounded. He received a Purple Heart in 1945 and discharged in April 1946. He stayed in the Army Reserves and was recalled to active duty during the Korean War.

Attention newly elected Officers for 2010-2011

The installation ceremony for VFW Post 5040 Officers will be conducted on **June 19, Saturday, 1:00 pm.** This is the day before Father's Day.

We are also trying to see if the Ladies Auxiliary will want to join in on the installation as well.

Even if you are not an officer, you are more than welcome to attend the proceedings and short ceremony that occurs at installation. Belcher told the overflow crowd at the Woodstock Opera House, "Memorial Day is first and foremost about remembrance. It is also about family, and it is about hope. We honor each of our returning wounded, their families and the families of the fallen."

Following the address by Major General Dennis Celletti, Commander of the Illinois Army National Guard, Moose Lodge Governor Randy Tipps presented a U.S. flag to city councilman Mike Turner. This continues a long-standing tradition of the Moose giving a flag to be flown in the Woodstock City Square.

John Sorensen, 1992 Commander of the Woodstock VFW, listed names of eight men from the local National Guard unit who have died in military service since 2001.

The eight: Private First Class Collier Barkus, killed in action July 8, 2004; Lance Corporal Jonathan Collins, killed in action August 8, 2004; Specialist Fourth Class Keith Nurnberg, killed in action, September 5, 2007; Sergeant Robert Weinger, killed in action, March 15, 2009; Sergeant Christopher Abeyta, killed in action March 15, 2009; Specialist Norman Cain III, killed in action March 15, 2009; Specialist Lukasz Saczek, died May 10, 2009; and Sergeant Jason McLeod, killed in action November 23, 2009.

Dwayne Raney, Past VFW and Legion Commander, gave both the invocation and the closing prayer.

Continuing a longstanding tradition, a dinner featuring ham and chicken was served at the VFW prepared by Pat Auvenshine and her staff.

Despite moving the Memorial Day observance from the Square to the Opera House many of the traditions continued. Nyda Fogarty, Auxiliary president, read General Logan's orders establishing Memorial Day in an 1868 directive.

Other program features included Jessica Babcock, Olson student, American's Creed. Kaitlyn Klein, Columbia College student, sang the National Anthem and Hannah Morgan, Rock County Christian School, sang "Bring Him Home."

Woodstock VFW participates as an active sponsor for the 57th year as a Woodstock Little League continues its current season at Merryman Fields, Bates and Emricson parks.

This year's season with photos of all 24 teams is featured in the current issue of Play Ball! a yearbook produced for the Little League by Don Peasley and Marybeth Vogrinc.

Don started Play Ball! in 1962 at a time when the VFW was one of the five primary sponsors of this youth baseball program for both girls and boys ages 7 to 12. Players now are ages 7-15 with the addition of the Teen-er League.

This year's opening pitch ceremony featured family members of Mike Palmquist, who died December 27. Palmquist served on the board and also managed a team. He was instrumental in the successful Las Vegas Night fundraising conducted for several years. Palmquist's first acquaintance with Little League was as a player in 1960.

Darrin Chonos, president, welcoming players to the program cited improvements for the 2010 season. League volunteers constructed a storage garage at Merryman Fields Park.

Said Chonos, "Little League provides a great atmosphere for all children in a structured organization. They receive coaching not only in baseball but in life lessons."

This year Little League has 34 teams with 405 players. New this year is the 50/70 pilot program. The program is named 50/70 because it is 50 feet from the pitching mound to home plate and uses 70-foot base pads.

Through the years the VFW has provided its facilities for Little League board meetings and player draft without any charge. Little League shows its appreciation by helping serve the annual turkey dinner in November.

Woodstock VFW News takes 1st place in **VFW National Publications Contest** By Matt Klos, VFW News Editor

Congratulations to Post 5040! Our Post was the winner of the 2010 National Publication Contest. This is our third win for first place in the last four years!

The rules for the Publication Contest were changed slightly this year. Last year for Post categories, the categories were sectioned off as Large Post: 750 or more members, Medium Post: 250-749 members, Small Post: 249 members or less. This year the Post categories were sectioned off as Large Post: 300 or more members, Medium Post: 200-299 members, and Small Post: 199 or fewer members. VFW Post 5040 fell into the Large Post this year, as we have about 400 members in our Post

When I saw the numbers change this year, I was very curious as to why there was a change in the categorization. I contacted Barb Wilson, editor of the Illinois VFW Department News, and asked her about the entries this year. Illinois has 349 Posts in the state. Entries this year tell a different story. According to Barb, there were three small, four medium, and nine large Posts that entered the contest this year. When I asked Barb for a possible reason why so few entries, she responded, "Not sure if posts/districts are cutting back, but I do know that both posts and districts put out newsletters but don't necessarily enter the contest."

So that might explain some of the low numbers. Winners of each state category move up to the national level. Since the re-categorization changed at the national level (which in turn determines what each department will use), I contacted National to find out why the change.

I contacted Kelly Von Lunen, VFW Publications Contest organizer, and asked how many entries were entered for the different Post levels. You would think it would be 50 for each category, one from each state. However, the numbers were 19 small, 19 medium, and 22 large. When I asked about the reason for the recategorization, Kelly wrote, "In evaluating last year's contest entries, I saw that the number of entries in each size category were not evenly distributed. So I pulled up Post membership reports and restructured the sizes so that each would have an equal number of eligible Posts. For the 2010 contest, I can say that this worked quite well."

From the numbers entered this year, each category was pretty evenly distributed overall.

In the spirit of competition, I enjoyed competing with the larger posts this year. Knowing that the "large" category was 300 or more members, there really wasn't an upwards limit on large Posts. If you weren't "small" or "medium", you fell into the "everything else" category. How big were the second and third place winners behind us? Second place winner, Bugle Newsletter (Post 2111, California) by Editor Russ Eseltine has over 1,410 members and the Third place winner, Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 131 (Post 131, Nebraska) by Editor Wilbur Bechtolt has over 1,050 members.

For another year, we get bragging rights as the top Post publication.

Congratulations to all the Post winners that entered this year and the editors and volunteers behind the publications. You did a fine job in making it to your respective levels at the District and National placements. Keep the papers going and good luck next year.

National Guard unveils monument tribute to fallen soldiers By Don Peasley

A monument honoring three Woodstock National Guard Armory members has been erected at the National Guard armory on U.S. Route 14. A ceremony unveiling this tribute to the three Delta Company, 178th Infantry soldiers killed in action March 15, 2009 took place Memorial Day. The three men honored with this permanent display include Sergeant Robert Weinger, Round Lake; Sergeant Christopher Abeyta, Midlothian; and Specialist Norman Cain III, Freeport.

Delta member Specialist Jason Litchford, Rockford, designed the 6-foot by 5-foot stone monument in the shape of an arrow. Faces of the soldiers are etched on inlayed marble slabs. Litchford held silent auctions and raffles to finance the tribute.

During the ceremony, families were presented an 8×10 marble plaque.

Pavers around the monument will be installed in the future to include names of other soldiers, including Specialist Lukasz Saczek, Lake-in-the-Hills, who died May 10, 2009 from non-combat injuries.

A prominent feature of this beautiful monument includes this tribute written by Specialist Litchford:

"Be it known that American heroes have walked proudly through this Armory you are about to enter. In this, you briefly walk the same path as those who have fallen. Here the brave are memorialized so as to never be forgotten.

"The rough rock represents the rugged terrain that winds its way through the mountains of Afghanistan, the destination of life paths courageously chosen and followed with the intrepidness of the American soldier.

"The marble brings to light that a new beautiful journey, one far smoother than the past, has now begun. The idea is somehow soothing that the new path shall not be traveled alone."

Ok, so what's going on you are probably asking yourself? The *VFW News* has been a monthly publication for...well...always, hasn't it? Yes, it has. Until this month. I am writing this paragraph at 11:00 pm on June 6, trying to finish up the newsletter. Everything else in the newsletter is placed and written. I do have to cut down the pictures before I send this to the printer, so another hour or two and I will really be done with this issue.

Yes, it was with some regret that I had to put two months together. Several reasons came up that kind of pushed me in this direction. The first reason is that even if I had this done a week or so ago, the Post Office still won't get it to you any sooner. Look at last month. At the Post meeting on May 17, the newsletter was still NOT delivered into homes. My wife dropped it off at the Post Office on May 5. The reason? Well, the bulk mail operator at Woodstock tried his best to explain that there was little he could do. The Post Ofwell as how mail is handled. From Woodstock, our newsletter goes to another processing facility. Our newsletter is also sent out in a class of mail that is pretty cheap. It's Standard Class mail, which means we get put in with some of the junk mail (e.g. flyers, advertisements, etc.). There are lots of businesses that are looking for the cheapest way to send mail and the Standard Class is the way to go. This has its drawbacks in that there is so much standard mail, sometimes it cannot be helped that mail sits. It doesn't have the priority that First Class does. There is nothing we can really do other than to put on a stamp and mail out the newsletter to everyone. Then you'd get it a whole lot faster. But this doesn't do us any good either because mailing out 500 plus newsletters at \$0.44 each would cost a lot of money each month, something that is not in our budget to do

The second reason is that I just got behind in getting the newsletter out. Over the weekend of May 21-23, I had gone camping. Each year my brothers and I take our kids (wives stay home) and we head to somewhere for the weekend, tent camping. That weekend was gone. The following weekend, which was Memorial Day weekend, I had a little food poisoning that held me back from going to any Memorial Day events, VFW or family related. Finally, the first weekend in June came and I managed to get this together.

The third reason is, I have to admit, I've lost some interest in putting the newsletter together. Don't get me wrong, the publication is wonderful for the Post. It's needed to get information out to the membership. But at different times of the year, there has been so little news that it makes me ask the question, "Do we really need a newsletter this month of xxx?". It's hard to come up with something for every column in the newsletter. When I look at other Post newsletters and see contributions from each officer in the Post, it makes me wish that our Post was able to do that too. How long has it been since you've seen one of your Post Officers write a column more than once in any given year?

I'm at a cross roads right now of trying to figure things out with the whole mailing and publication timing. In about two to three weeks you should be receiving this newsletter, just in time for July. I figure that if at the end of June or beginning of July, I should have the August / September issue in place, ready to send out. Will this go back to being a monthly newsletter for the August issue? I'm not sure. With our Post financial state right now, going bimonthly might be a smart financial move. We don't have a lot of "news" going on every month, so it might make sense.

Maybe I'll also try for some new content in the next few months. I've seen other Posts do this, publish their meeting minutes publicly in their newsletter that goes out to the membership.
