On this night also, **Lightning Raffle** will be played. **What is this you ask?** I had the same question. It sounds pretty fun and easy to play.

This is a raffle game that plays kind of like bingo. Since I was not familiar with this game, I had Ralph Ritter explain it to me. Each game of Lightning plays pretty quickly over the course of several minutes, and its not that hard to learn. For

each game, there will be 150 cards sold at \$1.00 each card. Each card is about the size of a pull-tab game card if you are familiar with these. The card, when opened, reveals three numbers. For each series of Lightning (Ralph said there would be five or six series played) there will be a different set of colored lightning cards (e.g. the cards you buy are only good for one series of play).

After the cards are sold for a series, a bingo cage full of balls numbered "1" through "66" will be turned, and individual balls will be pulled. If the three numbers on your card(s) are called out during the course of the game, you win (check the night of the game, but I think you have to yell out "Lightning" if you win.)

The balls are pulled and called out fairly quickly and there is always a winner

for each series.

You can buy as many cards as you like, so long as they are available. The winner of the series will be paid out in a 50/50 split of the series. Half the money sold in a series goes to the house, half to the winner (s). In some cases there may be a lone winner in a series, others there might be several.

This is something relatively new that the Post is trying. If there is interest in it, we might have more of these Lightning raffles in the future, such as at special events or Friday night dinners.

Also remember, if you have not turned in your pink raffle tickets please drop them off at the Post. Likely by the time you get this newsletter, it will be too late to mail them.

Results of blood drive January 20, 2008

We had a very successful blood drive this year considering the cold weather we experienced on January 20. Heartland Blood Center, the blood collection agency, expected about 18 donations. However, we exceeded this expectation with a total of 30 people who came to donate. From this, 20 people donated a single unit of blood, and three people donated a "double-red" donation (red cell Apheresis which counts as two units of blood). In total, 26 units of blood were collected. Even after the drive ended at about 12:15 pm, several potential donors came to the

Post wanting to donate blood, but we just ran out of time as the Heartland had already packed up the bus.

There were several volunteers this day, helping out to screen people, cook pancakes, run the bar, etc. A big "Thank you" to Commander Mike David (bar), Larry Dohm (kitchen), Alan Belcher (kitchen), Charlie Mathey (cashier), Fred Noble, Sid Sherwin (cooking), Howard Engstrom, and chairman John Mencotti (donor sign in). 

Thanks for all your work, Mark!




16MM FILM CANIS- TER FOUND AT VFW; RUMORS SPECU- LATE CONTENTS


Our sympathies go out to Frieda's family, as she will be missed by VFW Post 5040 and Ladies Auxiliary.



Voice of Democracy and Patriot's Pen contest winners recognized

The 2007/08 Voice of Democracy and Patriot's Pen winners and their families were treated to a spaghetti dinner on January 21 at the Post. VFW chairman Mike Lackey and Ladies Auxiliary chairwoman Chris Gehrke were the primary judges this year for the student oratory and essay contests.

The Patriot's Pen is a youth-essay writing contest endorsed by the National Association of Secondary School Principals' contest criteria, a nationwide competition that gives students in grades 6, 7 and 8 the opportunity to write essays expressing their views on democracy. Annually, more than 115,000 students participate in the annual contest. Contestants write a 300-400 word essay based on an annual patriotic theme, which for this year was "Why I am an American Patriot".

Receiving a \$100 savings bond in the Patriot's Pen, the winner from our Post this year was Taylor Pichen, 13, a seventh grader from Northwood Middle School in Woodstock.

The Voice of Democracy (VOD), endorsed by the National Association of Secondary School Principals' contest criteria, is an audio essay contest for high school students in grades 9-12. The annual contest, which is designed to foster patriotism, allows students the opportunity to voice their opinion in a three to five minute essay based on an annual theme, which for this year was "My Role in Honoring America's Veterans".

There were two winners this year in the VOD contest and each was given a \$150 savings bond. Stephanie Koerner, 18, is a Senior at Huntley High School. She will be attending University of Illinois at Chicago in the fall, majoring in Education with an emphasis as a secondary math teacher. Megan Keiber, 17, is a senior at Harvard High School. She will be attending Illinois State University this fall and is currently undecided in her major.

After the dinner, the students and their families were invited upstairs to be recognized by the VFW membership before the formal VFW meeting. After making the

announcement of the winners and giving them their bonds, the students were in for a little surprise. I don't think we had done this in the past, but someone in the audience requested that the essays be read aloud by the students themselves.

Only two of the three transcripts were available to read, but the students took the suggestion in stride. The two VOD winners, Stephanie and Megan, each read their essays. Understandably a little nervous standing in front of about 35 people to read their essays, the students did a wonderful job and all three were given a standing ovation by the Post members.

Although the essays from our Post did

not place at the District 5 Level which would allow their essays to move up to the higher judging levels, the winning students from all the VFW posts in District 5 were invited to a District dinner to recognize their participation.

In the Past, some of you reading the newsletter probably have asked the question of "what did the essays say?". New for this year, I am including the essays in the newsletter on this and the following pages and will also be putting them on website.

I can never remember a time in my family when I was growing up where there was a negative word spoken about the veterans of the United States of America. In fact, one my grandfather's proudest memories is when, after the bombing of Pearl Harbor, he asked his parents if he could quit high school in his senior year. He asked if they would sign for him to enlist in the Navy to go fight in the war to keep our country free. As a little girl, I remember watching parades sitting with my parents when the honor guards would come marching down the street with the American flag, and we would always stand up and put our hands over our hearts. Even though there have been times that I've heard disagreements

about governmental policies and certain politicians, I've only heard words of gracious praise for the men and women who dedicated themselves to serve our country in the military. My experience has always been to have respect for those who dedicated, sacrificed, and ultimately died for our liberty. I express much gratitude towards the future, present, and past veterans of the United States of America.

When the military recruiters come to my school, I always encourage them. The recruiters always set up a table outside the main office and talk to people about joining the military. One day, a Marine came to my high school and told the story of his training and how long it took. He talked about the grueling 12 week basic training that he had to endure. He said those weeks were the hardest time in his entire life. Standing there listening to his story made me more appreciative of all who serve. I've always been amazed at all the opportunities the military presents my generation and generations to come. I am very respectful of the veterans who are in the military, and I thank them for their service. I honor veterans by encouraging future veterans to serve our country with dignity as generations before them have.

I show support of the young and middle aged veterans who have sacrificed so much to insure our country's safety. One beautiful Sunday afternoon, I was at my grandparent's house, and they wanted to take my mother, my father, and me to a unique veteran's memorial. We drove 10 miles from my grandparent's home in Marseilles, Illinois. Just off the main highway we turned into a beautiful park like setting where the memorial was built several yards from the flowing Illinois River. The memorial consisted of several large, gray, granite stones with hundreds of names carved into them. All of the carved names were those of brave men and women who had fought and died in the Middle East over the last decade. Many Americans are unaware of how great the sacrifices have been during this time. At the base of one of the stones was a pair of army boots filled with concrete. The boots were those of a soldier who had died fighting for America. The minute I saw those, I better understood the ultimate sacrifice that many of our veterans have made.

I've attended many Memorial Day parades where the World War II veterans proudly wear their hats with pins and ribbons. One of my heroes is my grandfather who served in the Navy in the Pacific Theater on a boat named the LST 633.

I honor him by listening to his stories and experiences. He dropped out of high school and joined the Navy after the bombing of Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941.

My family and I recently had lunch with my grandparents, and my grandfather was talking about the trip my grandmother and he took to the Hawaiian Islands 30 years after World War II was over. He had the opportunity to go and stand at the memorial of the USS Arizona. When he started telling the story, he looked away, and I could tell that he had tears on his face. My grandmother spoke up and said that one of his childhood friends had been on the Arizona when it was bombed. As children, they lived across the street from one another, and frequently played basketball, baseball, and any other game they

could come up with to pass the time. Upon hearing the news of his good friend's death, he wasted no time in enlisting. His friend's death gave him an added determination to join the military and especially the Navy. All of his experiences and stories that he has to tell, make me feel very appreciative of those who fought for the United States of America.

At the memorial in Marseilles, there was a picture of a soldier. My grandfather looked at it and said, "I don't know who you would've become, but I know who you are - you are definitely a hero in my book." He looked up into the sky and shook his head as he walked back to the car. For me, honoring America's veterans comes down to showing respect for the sacrifices they've made. Those sacrifices enable us to experience life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. I am forever grateful.

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


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
