From 11 am to late afternoon, many visitors stopped by to admire the cars, take in a few drinks at the beer tent, listen to some music provided by volunteer DJ Keith Tinerella. Prepared food was provided by Lisa "soon to be" Lange and her daughter Whitney from our VFW kitchen.

At the end of the day, awards were handed out in several categories. "Fan Favorite" was taken by Mark Freund, VFW 5040 Member. He is the owner of Dodge Daytona, a 1969 replica of the car driven by Buddy Baker. He's had the car for 15 years and has been racing it for the last seven. "Best in Show" was taken by Jim Klein, owner of 1955 Ford F100.

Putting on a show this size took several months of preparation and was no small feat to pull together.

"Jeanne and I put in between 400-500 hours. It adds up quickly when you factor in actually contacting contestants, media, vendors, sponsors, etc. - plus all of the word of mouth promotion." said Bill Kulinski. Bill and his wife Jeanne put on last years show as well.

This result of the car show raised over \$1,600 for VFW Post 5040. About 20 or so volunteers helped to make this years car show a great success. Everyone who helped out volunteered their time at the car show including the kitchen, DJ, beer tent, and even the Hooter Girls.

Two Post 5040 members take trip to see WWII Memorial in Washington, D.C. By Matt Klos, VFW News Editor

How many of you, our member veterans, have had a chance to go to Washington, D.C. to see the WWII Memorial? How would you like a chance to go for free in a one day trip there and back to see some of the war memorials? Two of our VFW members recently had that chance to do this through Honor Flight Chicago.

Honor Flight Chicago was founded by four Chicago women who wanted to do something special to honor and thank our veterans. Their mission is to honor and thank veterans, especially now WWII veterans, by bringing them to Washington D.C., at no cost to the veteran, for a day of honor.

Completely a volunteer organization, Honor Flight Chicago has flown 625 veterans to Washington DC since February 2008. Veterans can fill out a form and be put on waiting list for one of the special flights that makes a trip from Midway Airport to Washington, D.C. to view the WWII Memorial and other memorials in a single day trip. Veterans are flown on a first-come, first-served basis. Within the waiting list, top priority is given to WWII Veterans and all other veterans with terminal illness. Their next priority is Korean War Veterans and then Vietnam Veterans.

Two of our VFW members, Harold Irwin and Floyd Miras had the opportunity to travel on Honor Flight on July 15, 2009.

Floyd Miras joined the Army Infantry (2nd Infantry Division out of Texas) in 1941. After spending two years in the Infantry, he took a test and was transferred into the Air Force and had the job of air crewman, flying combat missions in B-25's during WWII.

He spent most of his wartime service in the Philippines, involved in battle on the islands of Leyte, Luzon, and Mindoro. He served in the military for about 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ years. Floyd signed up for Honor Flight in August 2008.

Harold Irwan served in WWII in the Army Air Corps. He was already in the service two years before war broke out. His job while in the service was that of Tech Supply. Harold spent his time in the war in near Australia, around New Guinea and the Coral Sea. He too spent about 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ years in the service. Harold signed up for Honor Flight in September 2008.

Funny, neither man knew the other was going to be on the flight until they showed up at Midway airport. The day started early for both at about 2:00 am, time enough to get down to the airport by 4:00 a.m. and flight out at 6:50 am.

"While at the airport and having breakfast, we were entertained by three women in vintage WWII USO uniforms who sang songs from that period," said Floyd.

Guardians go with the flight (each guardian pays their own way to go). It worked out that Floyd's daughter, Elaine Mulligan, was his guardian for the day and Harold's daughter, Nancy Irwin, was his guardian for the day.

After a long day of seeing the memorials, the return trip gets them to Midway about 10:30 pm.

"When we taxied to the gate, there were fire trucks spraying water and airport police with lights on," said Harold. "Getting off the plane, we were greeted by at least 100 soldiers, men and women, of different services saluting all the veterans. Beyond them, there were about 600 or so people in the airport clapping and waving flags."

Floyd mentioned, "When I came home from the war, I got off the plane and went home. No one greeted me. This was quite a reception we got, even a little emotional. It was a great feeling though."

Both men said they really enjoyed the whole day and said that everything, from the beginning of the day to the end, was so well put together.

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bar, and many other duties to help get the Post going again and back on track.

Other accomplishments through the years include help bring back and working the blood drives that have been held at the Post, gathering supplies to be sent to soldiers overseas, helping set up the traveling Vietnam wall along with computer access to names and providing security while it was on the Woodstock Square, and starting Lightning on Friday nights a in 2008.

As part of the ceremony, several people were asked to come up on the stage and share some comments or stories with those in attendance.

Charlie Mathey commented about Ralph. "He helped in the care and maintenance of the Post. He installed the dishwasher, boilers, routed the septic, etc. We're lucky to have him as a member...you [Ralph] are appreciated."

Bob Gibson knew Ralph for quite a long time. Ralph grew up with Bob's daughter so he remembers him as a young boy. "If Ralph hadn't been around, this Post couldn't pay for the repairs he has done." said Bob. "He knew the right people to call and get whatever it was fixed."

Ralph's son, Brian, had several humorous comments about how his dad adapts and makes things work. "My dad called me up, told me he got a good deal on a fridge for the VFW kitchen. 'It doesn't fit,' dad said, 'but we'll make it fit.' Not only did it not fit through the door into the kitchen, but in the space it was to go had to be cut away and modified to handle it."

Bud Porter got a laugh with his comment that "Ralph had the people skills of Attila the Hun".

Before ending the ceremony, Ralph got a chance to go up on stage and thanked everyone for the appreciation night. "I truly believe in volunteering," Ralph commented. "It's not only me that was doing this volunteering over these several years, but also my wife. She has supported me in what I have done at the Post and also was a big part in doing actual volunteer work."

Ralph indicated that he would tone down his involvement with the physical upkeep going forward and said that "It's time for other people to step up. I'll provide the answers, but others will need to do the work."
